Dear Senate President Scutari, Assembly Speaker Coughlin, Senator Sarlo and Assemblyman Danielsen:

We, the undersigned organizations, are writing to express our strong opposition to bill S-2930/A-4045, which would fatally weaken the Open Public Records Act (OPRA).

For two decades, OPRA has been a cornerstone of our state's democracy, ensuring that taxpayers and voters can hold government agencies and their elected officials accountable.

The bill that is being fast-tracked, however, threatens to eviscerate fundamental principles of open government by restricting access to critical records and by making it more difficult for community advocates to vindicate their rights under the law.

It is shockingly ironic that both Assembly and Senate committees will consider the bill at the same time during "National Sunshine Week," which celebrates the fundamental role of transparency in a free society. This is an attack on transparency and part of a disturbing trend in the New Jersey Legislature, where lawmakers decrease public access to information under the guise of "transparency."

Many organizations have raised concerns regarding OPRA reform over the last year, yet the current language of these bills indicates that our concerns were not taken seriously. While the bill, as introduced, has many issues, we would like to focus mainly on problematic provisions that remove mandatory fee-shifting, create exemptions for email logs, and create an unnecessary police records task force.

Under the current law, residents are entitled to recover attorneys' fees incurred when they are improperly denied access to public records. This provision undergirds the entire OPRA framework because it allows community groups and citizens to hold bad actors accountable even if they don't have the tens of thousands of dollars required to pursue an appeal.

Removing this provision will embolden state and local officials to openly flout the law and deny open records requests because they know that working families and grassroots organizations simply don't have the financial resources to hold them accountable.

At the same time, the bill creates broad new exemptions that shield critical email and call records from public view. Under current law, New Jerseyans may request email and call logs to better understand government correspondence.

This bill makes access to emails more difficult by significantly increasing the amount of specific information a requestor must include to receive the requested records, making it much more likely that their OPRA requests will be denied. In addition, the bill requires all email addresses to be redacted. This slows down access to email communications and keeps the public from learning who the public official is emailing.

Instead of granting the public more access to police disciplinary records, this bill creates a police records task force whose membership would heavily favor law enforcement and government perspectives. This is deeply offensive to the communities most impacted by policing. Beyond the unfair membership, there is no need to create such a task force.

State court decisions have expanded access to police records. As a result, the public has been able to see the significant racial disparities in the use of police force. New Jersey should scale back OPRA's criminal investigatory records exemptions, which allow police departments to be too secretive.

Overall, this legislation is particularly troubling in light of the Legislature's passage last session of the Elections Transparency Act. This Orwellian-named bill opened the floodgates to dark money interests spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in key legislative races to mislead voters in elections less than six months ago.

The Legislature would do well to remember that a similarly rushed process that failed to meaningfully engage advocates severely weakened our state's campaign finance laws while empowering powerful corporate interests.

This bill is even more outrageous because it will have no meaningful impact on the purported problem of commercial users utilizing OPRA as a data mining tool at significant municipal cost — the so-called reason why the Legislature must rush this legislation through without adequate public input.

In a state with a well-deserved reputation for corruption, with a United States Senator under indictment for accepting gold bars to influence federal approval on hundreds of millions of dollars' worth of weapons sales to an authoritarian foreign government, we should be expanding access to public records to safeguard taxpayer dollars — not further shielding public officials from scrutiny.

We sincerely hope that you will heed the lessons learned from recent history. Instead of ramming through ill-considered legislation that threatens to once again weaken our democracy, we call on you to change course.

It's not too late to sit down with advocates to develop a series of amendments that will strengthen public access and safeguard taxpayer dollars. Your leadership and political will are needed now more than ever.
